

A Pastoral Letter

Dear Friends

For the first time in my 17 years as a Minister, I'm not involved in a church pantomime. I'm not sure if I'm relieved or disappointed! Dressing up in ridiculous outfits (I've been a parrot on more than one occasion – see photo!) and performing on stage is not something that comes naturally to me. But in the two churches (one in Huddersfield and one in Swansea) where there has been a tradition of a church



pantomime, I got involved. Mostly because I knew that being part of something like that would be good for nurturing relationships.

Relationships are at the heart of what we are all about in church: our relationship with God, our relationship with each other and our relationship with the world around us.

Lent is now (almost) upon us and it's a time for examining our relationships. A time for examining our relationship with God, and the way we live our lives. Joan Chittister, a Benedictine Sister says this: "Lent is a call to weep for what we could have been and are not. Lent is the grace to grieve for what we should have done but did not. Lent is the opportunity to change what we ought to change but have not." If you think about it, this is all about relationship – with God, with people and with the world.

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My prayer for you and me is that over the coming weeks of Lent we will take this time to examine the way we live our lives and our relationships. Where there is selfishness, may we offer kindness. Where there is violence, may we offer gentleness. Where there is exclusion, may we offer love. Where there is greed, may we offer generosity. Where there is anguish, may we offer hope. May we know God tenderly holding and enfolding us, through the days of Lent and beyond.

Back to the pantomime... All pantomimes have the same basic story – the triumph of good over bad. And of course, that's also at the heart of our own Christian story and one which we shall recall in our Holy Week and Easter services.

Who is Julie Bradshaw, the new Supernumerary?

In the summer of 2021, my husband, Pete, and I moved to Bedford from Luton, as I retired, sat down. I had been 12 years in Luton as Superintendent Minister, mostly of the South Bedfordshire Circuit, I had loved this role, despite many challenges, but I was certainly looking forward to some sitting down.

It's taken a while, though, to adjust to life as a Supernumerary. I decided I'd keep a very low profile for a year, so far as the Methodist Church was concerned, not taking any preaching appointments, and saying "no" to any job that might be offered. I'm sure this was the right thing to do, to give myself some space for this time of transition, but it felt very strange and disorienting, mind you, everything did!

We're feeling pretty settled now in Bedford, a year or so on. We like it here very much, and, living in Dudley Street, it's lovely to be able to walk to many places: it's helped a lot with my health and fitness! So, since September, I have appeared on the Preaching Plan a few times, and it has been like coming home to be in Methodist churches and share in worship with them. Thank you, you have made me feel very welcome. I am also now serving as a supervisor for three Methodist Ministers, something I trained for as a Superintendent, and have experience in. It is good to be able to listen to Ministers on the front line and perhaps encourage them a little, and it helps me to feel connected and useful.

Finding the right place to worship was a tricky task, not helped by the newfound freedom of weekends when we could go away in our camper van or visit our children: we have five between us scattered around the country. They are all married, and three families have young children, so we are sometimes called on to help. In fact, one of the joys of retirement has been the opportunity to spend more time with my grandchildren, and it has been lovely having them to stay here: we're so lucky having Russell Park at the end of our road, and the river.

However, all these pulls on our time meant we were not in Bedford all that much at weekends, especially at first, when everyone was trying to make the most of the opportunity to mix and meet up that had been so difficult during the pandemic. I visited several nearby Methodist churches, but it's a strange thing being a retired Minister, and, somehow, they didn't feel quite right for this initial time as a Supernumerary. Then I looked at what were my nearest churches geographically, and clearly Christ Church, sitting in the same road as our house, looked like a possibility: I have always been ecumenically minded and grew up in the Church of England too. I crept into the back of the church and sat anonymously for a few services, not volunteering very much information about myself unless I was asked specifically. Strangely, this felt more comfortable and sustainable as a place to worship regularly, despite all that felt uncomfortable! I am now helping with a young people's group on a Sunday from time to time and regularly helping with an afterschool club for years five and six. I have been involved in youth and children's work all my life, and whilst a Minister, did what I could to encourage and support this work: it felt natural, then, to offer to help in this way. I am not sure if I will continue to attend Christ Church for ever, but, for now, attending my nearest local church seems like the right thing for me, and I love being able to leave just five minutes before the service begins and walk: somehow I still manage to be late sometimes!!

Settling in Bedford has been helped by joining some groups and starting some new hobbies. My husband and I both belong to Opus 18, the Community Choir that meets at Priory each week. I love to sing and have usually tried to belong to a choir wherever we have lived. My husband has been a Morris dancer for many years now, and he has joined Red Cuthbert Morris, a side that meets to practise in St Cuthbert's Church Hall. I was roped in when they did some singing for a Wassail event and went along to play my guitar. Before I knew it, I was one of the musicians on percussion, first tambourine, but now on drum. I have rather a lot of learning to do, but I'm giving it a try. It's fun to go with them when they dance out and to have a part to play instead of just being in the audience.

I have always wanted to have a go at pottery so I looked for somewhere to pursue this now I have the time. Bedford Arts & Crafts Centre was the obvious choice, but their courses always seemed full, until a summer school came up in July 2022, and I was able to go for a week and learn some techniques. I loved it, and now I'm on the regular weekly course, enjoying playing with clay, even if some of the finished products are less than brilliant! I particularly appreciate the camaraderie of the group, just eight of us, focussing on clay but having a jolly good chinwag at the same time, lots of stories and good listeners, too.

I hope that this gives you some idea of who Julie Bradshaw, the new Supernumerary, is, a snapshot of me today. I look forward to getting to know the Circuit, and meeting some of you as I come to preach in your church over the coming years.

Multiple Sclerosis Therapy Centre in Bedford - celebrating our 40th anniversary this year

The MS Therapy Centre is a charity that was set up in 1983 by a group of people with MS who decided that they wanted to provide help, support and therapy for others living with MS. Funds were raised and the centre has gone from strength to strength and won several awards over the years. It

is not funded by the NHS and needs to find approximately £1,000 per day to cover its running costs, which is a huge challenge. All therapies are provided free to people with MS, but a donation is politely requested. The facilities include two Baro chambers (for oxygen therapy), a large physio room, a specialist gym and a hydrotherapy pool. There are also a number of complementary therapies available such as reflexology, APS therapy, Bowen technique and sessions of Pilates and Tai Chi.

The Centre aims to provide a complete service that encourages people with MS to make the best of their lives. It is an integrated approach, with core therapies and complementary therapies being provided under one roof, that allows people to dip in and out of each therapy as required.



People do not need to be referred by a GP or specialist, but they will need to book a visit to see the facilities and have an appointment with one of the physiotherapists who will help to clarify whether any of the therapies on offer may be of benefit to them.

CLAPHAM METHODIST CHURCH

When I was asked to do an update on Colin Shorley's piece as featured in the Spring 2018 Circuit magazine, I thought 'Where do I start?' Clapham Methodist Church has been established for 146 years, and over the years there have been major changes to the rooms and hall, but not in the last five years.

The facilities on offer are very much there for our local community: our Bookings Secretary had hardly any free slots prior to COVID. School for Seniors was thriving with healthy attendance each Wednesday. When we returned to the new 'normal', many hirers had secured alternative premises and things were looking 'bleak'. However, even with increased hire charges we now have several regular hirers.

On return to worshipping in church again (after COVID restrictions eased) we have a 10.00am service each Sunday, and attendance is between 20 and 30. We are fortunate to have our Minister Rev Chris Sandy with us on a regular basis leading us in worship, and are so blessed to have Local Preachers, and church members who willingly lead us in Local Worship (LW) three times each quarter. With much encouragement from Rev Chris, one LW is now led by the young people, which is wonderful. Sadly, during the last five years we said 'Goodbye' to our 8.15am Holy Communion and breakfast. For some members, this was hard to adjust to, as much fellowship had been shared preparing and eating together. Quite often our 10.00am preacher would arrive early to enjoy breakfast and fellowship too!

Youth Club (which met fortnightly on Friday evening) and Junior Church have been unable to restart since COVID. Our young people, few in number, offer so much, often reading a Bible passage on a Sunday morning and helping Stewards with practical tasks. In the last 12 months, Charles has felt a calling to be a Worship Leader, and as a church we are really supporting and encouraging him. We are able to include a variety of worship music and traditional hymns, as our audiovisual system has been enhanced greatly by the installation of two large televisions to the front of the church, although we do need to improve the sound quality.

This spring we are starting up Bible study sessions in the form of a house group. We trust this initiative will enhance worship and knowledge of God's teaching.

Clapham is part of SCALLOP Mission Group of churches, and it is a pleasure to support the once a quarter service, when representatives from each church play a small part. Friendships and support networks have grown greatly through such services.

Our church works closely with our Anglican friends under 'Clapham Joint Churches' banner. We hold joint services for World Day of Prayer, Good Friday and in 2022, a Walk of Witness within the village which was a success, with all ages in attendance. We also join together for Powerpoint Children's Holiday Club, Party in the Park (alternate years in June – next one in 2024), Remembrance Sunday and Christingle Service. It is great to reach out to all in our community and bless them by such events.

Sadly, over the last few years our membership has dropped due to the passing of established members of the church and people's declining health. However, in recent months it has been a pleasure to welcome new members too. We now pray for the Holy Spirit to prompt and guide us as to how to serve our community and 'grow our church' and share the love of the Lord Jesus.

In closing a big Thank You to all who serve so willingly: each and every one is valued. Let's get excited about what the future holds for us as a church and Circuit.

What has been happening at Langford Chapel in these last few years? Sadly, the children's work had already dwindled by the time COVID raised its ugly head. Sunday Club had shrunk to one Sunday a month, and as the numbers of children shrank still further, it was not viable to continue, especially as the leaders both moved away from the village. We pray that the excellent work done in previous years will continue to bear fruit in the young lives which were touched. Even Wacky Wednesday held in half-term week became more difficult with fewer children choosing to enrol and leaders becoming older.

Then COVID appeared and everything changed. During the time when the church was closed, we kept in regular touch with all our members and adherents through a weekly news sheet, which still continues. They all received either by email or hard copy the service published each week on the Methodist Church website. Many of us discovered Zoom, and joined in Rev Lorna's Mission Group service, each Sunday morning. When it was possible to meet outdoors in small groups, two of our members generously hosted us on Wednesday mornings in their garden, where we were able to distance ourselves conveniently. We held our Church Council there as well. As soon as it was allowed, we convened a Risk Assessment Committee and agreed to open at the earliest opportunity. Most people returned as soon as possible. With our media facilities now in place, we were able to enjoy a variety of singing, videos, etc. to enhance our worship. This was especially valuable when we were unable to sing ourselves.

Wednesday coffee mornings have continued weekly and become popular with a number of people from outside the regular church fellowship. We have tried to hold Bible study and prayer times during the coffee mornings on some Wednesdays, but that has not been entirely successful and we need to think and pray about where we go from here. The first Sunday of every month is a Mission Group service for Lorna's four churches with the venues rotating. While not all the congregation are able or willing to travel to other churches, the number of Langford members who do attend is encouraging. We have continued to hold a Prayer Week in October when we set aside an hour each day to meet and pray for people and situations which have been brought to our attention.

At the end of November we welcomed the Stotfold Salvation Army Band who gave an evening of Christmas music. Despite a clash with England playing in the World Cup, the chapel was comfortably filled and everyone enjoyed the occasion.

The Anglicans joined us for our Covenant Service and this was followed by lunch in the schoolroom. We are a friendly, welcoming congregation, who would love to see new faces join us. We are hampered by our lack of parking, but continue in good heart, looking out for each other and trying to be good witnesses for Christ in our local area.

WORKING WITH LOCAL SCHOOLS AT PRIORY METHODIST CHURCH

Sharing the Christian story with children is so important, especially as many families do not have a Christian background, and opportunities such as *Open the Book* provide good ways of doing that. Priory has been blessed to work in a number of other ways with local schools recently.

Following a break because of COVID, we were thrilled to be welcoming the younger children from Goldington Green Academy (some 200 children plus teachers and helpers) back for Christingle this January. It's always an exciting event and wonderful to see the children walking back to school carefully clutching their completed Christingles.

This year, the older children used Priory as a venue for their Christmas assemblies. This was at the suggestion of one of the teachers at the school. It is good to know that they feel welcome with us, and there was good feedback from school staff and from the parents who attended.

In our worship on Education Sunday in September, we heard about the wonderful work of the Impact schools' workers in many schools in the Bedford area, leading assemblies, providing prayer spaces and lunch clubs and much more. As a result, several people signed up to support that work in prayer or financially. In addition, four people volunteered to take part in the Barn Nativity, which was held this year at St John's & St Leonard's Church in the town centre. The story of the Nativity was re-enacted in several scenes in the church and gardens and around 400 children attended, together with their teachers. They came from schools in Bedford and surrounding villages - as far away as Marston and Langford. This was a great way to share the real meaning of Christmas, and the children had lots of interesting questions. Each one took home a booklet with the Christmas story, which they could share with their family. From 27th - 31st March there will be a similar presentation of the Easter story. Volunteers will be needed for this, especially men they need 12 disciples!!

May Day Festivals by Jonathan Payne

After the hardship of winter, and hunger of early spring, May was a time of merriment. May festivals go back to the dim and distant unrecorded past and were more commonly celebrated than they are today. May Day celebrations took their name from the Roman goddess Maia – the goddess of nature and growth: the month of May is named after her. The early Celts celebrated the feast of Beltane in honour of their sun god Beli. There are many May festivals held around the country and some feature a permanent maypole, while others erect one for the day. Ickwell is one of a small number of permanent maypoles in the UK.

The May Festival held on Ickwell Green near Biggleswade is one that dates back to 1565 according to the Churchwardens' accounts at

Northill Church – the event celebrated its 450th anniversary in 2015! Early records indicate a traditional procession from Northill to Ickwell with the May Queen and her attendants followed by dancers, Old



Scholars and Morris Men. Today, children living in the parish or attending one of the schools are invited to elect their May Queen and attendants. Dancers – children from Upper Caldecote along with those from Ickwell and Northill and the surrounding hamlets in the Northill Parish, dressed in period dresses and accompanied by lads in smocks,

take us back to times past, performing some traditional country dances in the arena and ribbon dances around the pole.

This festival is held on the picturesque village green with its ancient oak tree and the Old Smithy, once used by Thomas Tompion the renowned clockmaker who lived nearby. The green features cricket and football matches in season and is surrounded by some quaint thatched cottages – a typical 'Old English' village green.

A permanent maypole became a feature on Ickwell Green in the late 1800s, provided by Mr John Harvey, a former resident of Ickwell Bury. This replaced the pole which had been erected annually for the event. The pole has been replaced a number of times over the years due to age and decay. A new pole was erected in January 2022 and should serve us well for the next 40 years! The festival was cancelled during WWI and WWII, but the weather and COVID restrictions have been the cause of more recent cancellations. It did however make a welcome return in 2022. This year's event on the early May Bank holiday on 1st May 2023 has events on the green from late morning and the procession leaves Northill at 1.30pm to be followed by the crowning of the new May Queen in the arena at 2.00pm. On the green there are also a number of stalls and sideshows run by local organisations and charities, and refreshments are available too. However, the Bedford and Letchworth Morris sides make their annual pilgrimage to the green to celebrate the arrival of May Day, 1st May at about 6.30am, with dancing around the maypole and singing some 'May songs'.
