



Hello

And if we struggle to answer this, if we aren't seeing God at work in what we are doing, we need to ask, 'Why not?' and reflect on what that means.

So, things to focus on moving forward - growth, and seeing God at work.

I look forward to hearing from you all about both!

PROFILE OF A VISITING PREACHER by Rev Barbara Ebeling

I am very pleased to be able to help out the Circuit from time, thanks to my husband's friend Glynne Rowlands who put my name forward.

A few credentials:

I was brought up in the Baptist church but found a niche in the Church of England. I was baptized and confirmed at Waltham Abbey back in 1967.

Many years later, after marrying, bringing up two sons and working as a Social Worker and a Social Studies teacher, I trained on the St Albans Diocese Ministerial Training Scheme.

I worked as a Lay Chaplain in Shenley Mental Hospital and was one of the second group of women to be ordained Deacon and then Priest in 1994.

I was lucky to serve my curacy in a Methodist/Anglican ecumenical partnership at St Hugh and St John's Church in Chells, Stevenage.

There was no Methodist Minister in post at the time, so I was "Recognised and Regarded" and enjoyed being part of the Methodist ministry there and around the Stevenage Circuit.

My curacy at Chells was in a wonderful ecumenical partnership which had been set up by Kathleen Richardson,* whom some of you will remember, and with the Vicar they set up a community that accepted each other first and foremost as Christians. I missed it when I had to go back to being just Anglican!!

As one of the first female Vicars, in 1999 I was appointed to the parishes of Great Barford, Blunham, Roxton and Tempsford and spent nine happy years there.

After retirement from there in 2008, I did another four years half-time in Thundridge and High Cross near Ware.

We moved to Biggleswade in 2021 to be near to one of our sons and his family. Our other son and his family live in Japan.

Thank you for inviting me, and I look forward to getting to know you all soon.

LONDON ROAD METHODIST CHURCH, BEDFORD

"Is there anywhere I can play table tennis?"

The above question, asked by a gentleman new to the neighbourhood, planted an idea in the mind of one of the Stewards at London Road. A "Community Club" was the outcome. On the last Friday evening of each month we now have a time of pure recreation, enjoying such activities as table tennis, pool, table football and dominoes, from 7 to 9 o'clock. There is also plenty of opportunity to have a good old natter over tea and coffee. We have ample facilities and room for anyone who would like to come along, even if only for a short time.

Since the previous update on life at London Road in the summer 2022 issue there have been other changes. We have moved! We are now in the Bedford Methodists Mission Group with Park Road, Priory and Putnoe Heights. All the four churches are represented on a working group which is actively considering how we can work more effectively together. One of several suggestions is to form a team, sporting a logo proclaiming that we are Bedford Methodists, to compete in pub quizzes or games. This has been widened to include voluntary community work such as litter picking. We are still very much in the planning stage.

Our premises continue to be used on Thursday afternoons by Bedford Foodbank as a very busy collection centre, and Citizens Advice Bureau have a presence there. As I write at the end of August we are receiving further enquiries for use of the hall from community groups.

We are extremely grateful for the financial generosity of both our Circuit and the District that enabled us in 2024 to instal solar panels and replace 14 windows. We have also installed broadband and have recently started to share our services online. We have recently made the outside areas more secure and safer to use.

Since our previous report, some of our very dedicated members have passed away, but they remain with us in the form of a small memorial garden. As dear friends leave us, we continue to welcome new worshippers, and it is wonderful to see them growing in the faith. In August, an adult friend was baptised and we received a new member. We presented them with cards and books which we feel sure will help them in their walk with the Lord.

Not to be forgotten is Messy Church! We usually hold this once a quarter, three times each year on a Saturday with the fourth session being a Messy Nativity Sunday service. It is always popular and attracts families including those who are not regular worshippers with us. Two of our members attended the Messy Church Conference in June which they found very encouraging and worthwhile, and they will be putting the new ideas and material into action!

In November we will have a special service with our Anglican friends at St Michael and All Angels, just a few hundred yards down the road from us. At this service we will re-affirm the Declaration of Intent between the two churches as we continue to tell of our Saviour's love.

God sent gifts, privileges and opportunities

When I finally became an accredited Local Preacher in August 2011, I thought the studying was done, and I could just lead worship, led by God, and that would help the Circuit which, at that time, was struggling to fill the Plan.

<u>BUT</u>, God had other plans, because over the last 14 years, God has developed my ministry in far much more than I, and perhaps others, expected, way back in 2011.

Thankfully, my style of preaching God's Word seems to be very acceptable as I humbly accept invitations to lead worship on special Sundays, often in other Circuits and denominations, and also with uniformed organisations, around campfires etc. Leading school assemblies is also wonderful. God has also led me to serve him at Anjulita Court MHA Care Home since 2012, leading worship and Songs of Praise and making pastoral visits - it's so enriching and a real privilege.

God has truly used the gifts He has bestowed on me to a great degree.

With the formation of the Eastern Section of the Circuit, God has used my gifts and graces to help Rev Leslie Noon in her seven churches, both in the Preaching Plan and in pastoral work. It's so rewarding - God at work yet again.

In the past few months, I have taken a couple of funerals, and I'm thankful to Leslie for her blessing and her guidance as I liaise with bereaved and grieving families. Again, I feel really privileged to be given these opportunities to show God's love and compassion to folk who are really hurting inside.

Joyfully, I also assisted Leslie in a baptism in early August, another first for me, and it was a wonderful occasion.

Most unexpectedly in June 2023, I was asked if I would consider being authorised by Connexion to preside over Holy Communion, as our Leadership Team thought I had the gifts and graces, plus I gave lots of availability dates, both valid reasons for asking. Well, it took me about three seconds to say yes, as I felt this was God's way of using my gifts again.

It has certainly helped in the making of the Circuit Plan as, up to now, I've led 50 services which included Holy Communion. I count it a real privilege to serve in this way.

Presiding over Holy Communion has led to me being able to visit those folk who aren't able to get to church any more and I'm able to have a cuppa and catch up with them and have a prayerful time concluding with Holy Communion. I can't put in words how it feels to just be there. I usually come away feeling ten feet tall.

I am so thankful for the training I received from Rev Lorna Valentine, and the continuing love, guidance and support from Rev Leslie Noon, and last, but not least, my dear wife Jan, who keeps my feet on the ground when my over-enthusiasm takes over, but she does it in an attitude of love and grace.

Way back in 2011, I couldn't have foreseen just what God intended for me. There's a lesson there, in that sometimes we should just wait, just listen, and let God work through us. I'm so grateful I listened. May I encourage you, my reader, to do the same.

As the years roll on, I pray that God will continue to use me as he sees fit, and to shower me, and those who listen to me, with many blessings.

Circuit Matters

Dear Friends

We are delighted to welcome Rev Sydney Sichilima, and by the time you read this we may have held Sydney's Welcome Service on the 5th October. Sydney joins us from Zambia, but as I write Sydney's wife and children are yet to join him. Sydney will have primary pastoral responsibility for Haynes, Kempston East, Kempston West and Wootton.

We also welcome Rev Silas Wood to his new position as Circuit Superintendent and Rev Leslie Noon as our Deputy Superintendent.

It has been a busy summer period with the forming of three separate Circuit invitation committees:

Silas offered a 12-month extension to his current period. The first Circuit invitation committee has completed a consultation period with Silas' churches; a reasoned statement was then shared at the Circuit Meeting, and I am pleased to confirm that Silas will be staying with us until July 2027, spending the next two years as our Superintendent.

For the Bedford churches, Rev Chris Sandy will move on to a new station from September 2026, and we continue to pray for Chris as he goes through that process. The second Circuit invitation committee has been considering the appointment of a Deacon rather than a conventional Presbyter. We know that the Methodist Church has a shortage of Presbyters, so we hope that following the Deacon route is most likely to fill the role. The main difference between a Deacon and a Presbyter in the Methodist Church is that a Deacon is primarily a servant leader focussed on service and community outreach. We feel that our Bedford churches together offer an exciting opportunity for a Deacon, as jointly we reach out into the wider Bedford community growing our Methodist presence. We are in the final stages of submitting the profile and we should know more in January.

For the Eastern Section, Rev Leslie Noon will be sitting down (retiring) from July 2026, and we continue to pray for Leslie as she works towards that next life stage. The third invitation committee have been working on creating the profile for that Section; the profile has now been submitted, and we will know in February if we have been matched to a Presbyter, so please continue to pray for that.

Thank you to everyone who has been involved in the three Circuit invitation committees, our ministerial team who have had to chair each other's committees, the church representatives who have attended and the Circuit

Stewards. It has been a lot of work co-ordinating the three groups and meeting the various timescales required for the process.

Whilst I am saying thank you, I would also like to say a huge thank you to Stephanie (our Circuit Manager and Safeguarding Lead) for all of her work sorting out the Wootton Manse with furniture, crockery and other furnishings ahead of the arrival of Sydney, and also for all of her other work sorting various life arrangements from schooling to access to doctors etc. We know that this has taken a lot of work in addition to her normal day job and everyone in the Circuit is very thankful, not least of course Sydney, who now has a lovely family home in Wootton. Thank you also to the many people who supported with donations for this.

As you may be aware, Jane McVey is stepping back from her role as Coordinating Circuit Steward, but I am delighted to say that she has agreed to stay on as part of the Circuit stewarding team. Jane has worked incredibly hard over a number of years on the Circuit Leadership Team, providing great knowledge, leadership and wisdom as we have approached a variety of challenges. On a personal note, I will always be thankful for the support that Jane provided to me when I became a Circuit Steward. Thank you, Jane, for all of your work leading us, and thank you for offering to continue as part of the team.

"Our Church's Future Story" On Saturday 8th November there will be a meeting at Kempston East Methodist Church from 10.00am – 12.30pm led by Rev Silas Wood and Angela Turner, our District Discipleship Enabler. We are asking each church to send a minimum of two people. We will be focussing on the "Our Church's Future Story" resources provided by the Methodist Church so we can look at growth plans. This will include personal spiritual growth, missional growth and numerical growth. Each church will form a Growth Plan and Circuit funds will be made available for resources to implement the plan. I pray that this will be a well-attended event, and that over the coming years with Silas at the helm, as a team in North Bedfordshire, not only will we grow our personal faith, but that we will become stronger and grow together, and ultimately, we will see more people experiencing the love of Christ.

Kempston East Wesley Guild



100 and still going

Kempston East's Wesley Guild will be 100 years old this year. The Wesley Guild in Kempston was formed on 17th September 1925 when it was combined with the well-established meeting, the 'League of Fellowship'. The joint meeting then became known as the 'League of Fellowship and Wesley Guild' which met between September and May, just as we do today. At some time the 'League of Fellowship' part of the name was dropped.

The origin of the Guild motto, 'One Heart, One Way' goes back to the Guild's Founder's Manual, written by the Reverend W. B. Fitzgerald in 1903, where he writes that our motto is a translation of that used by the Earl of Exeter, 'Cor Unum Via Una, and after the motto had been adopted he brought attention to the fact that that these words occur in Jeremiah chapter 32 (King James translation) - They shall be my people and I will be their God and I will give them one heart and one way that they may fear me for ever, for the good of them and of their children after them. And I will make an everlasting covenant with them, that I will not turn away from them, to do them good but I will put my fear in their hearts that they shall not depart from me.'

The Wesley Guild was set up with four elements - **Devotional**, **Christian Service**, **Literary and Cultural** and **Social and Musical**. Being a midweek meeting and with churches being able to provide a meeting place, Guilds attracted many young people

and this continued for many years. Unfortunately, this is not the situation now: younger people have found many other ways to spend their leisure time, so much so that very few Guild meetings now exist and those that do are supported by mainly elderly people.

Our Guild at Kempston East held regular weekly meetings on Tuesday evenings between September and May, but following the disruption of COVID, once we were able to meet again it was decided to move to Wednesday afternoons. We still prepare our programme around the four aims and invite a varied selection of speakers, presenters and entertainers to our meetings.

Although the Guild was formed in September 1925, we have always held our Anniversary Services in October, presumably to avoid the start of the Methodist year and Harvest festivities. This year is special for us, and we shall be holding our 100th Anniversary Service on Sunday 12th October at 10.30am when a former President of the Methodist Conference, the Rev Dr Mark Wakelin will be the preacher. Many of our friends from the Circuit churches have joined with us for our meetings over the years, and anyone who is able to come to this special service will be most welcome.


The Circuit Library now has over 1000 books. The majority of these are listed in the profile under *Goodreads.com* and range from contemporary authors like Pete Greig to classics like Strong's *Systematic Theology*.

The books are tagged into genres such as biographical (my favourite); daily readings; meditations; study guides; theological (more in-depth contributions) and various other categories, the largest of which is Christian living - the default when the book didn't fit under anything else!

However, there are 70 that are ex-directory as it were, because they are not listed in Goodreads.com, including a few titles from well-known names like C H Spurgeon and Stuart Briscoe but mostly

obscurer authors like Jean Nilsen and Ron Dale, that were friends of the donors.

One that caught my attention was "From a Mother's Pen – selections from the spiritual writings of Susanna Wesley" by Charles I Wallace. There are extracts from her journals and letters covering advice to her children, interest in theological thinkers of the time as well



her own spiritual reflections and the account of the rectory fire when her son John Wesley nearly died.

For women, for justice, for Christ

During 2025 our Circuit is playing host to two MWiB District Days, when women from around the District meet together for fellowship, worship and usually a speaker on a specific subject. On 7th June we met at Trinity in Biggleswade and were privileged to have Rev Leonora Wassell, Co-Chair of the National MWiB Committee speaking about her visit to the United Nations Women's Gathering in New York, as well as introducing us to The Butterfly Movement which seeks to highlight the continuing global issue of violence against women.

The second District Day we are hosting will be on Saturday 25th October at Putnoe Heights Church. In the morning we shall be launching our new District Charity, CHUMS, which began nearly 30 years ago at Keech Hospice, to support children after bereavement. It eventually moved to Wrest Park and now has a wider role, covering young people's mental health and wellbeing, baby loss and suicide bereavement.

Our speaker will be Richard Luscombe, who is a member of GCMC (Flitwick) and has a personal interest in the work done. He has been involved with CHUMS since 2014. In the afternoon MWiB retiring Co-Chair, Maggie Woods, will give us an insight into her recent visit to Rwanda. Thank you to Putnoe for offering to host this day. It should be very interesting and we hope for a good attendance.

With regard to The Butterfly Movement there will be a Service of Thanksgiving and Affirmation on Tuesday 25th November from 10.30am-12.30pm at Wesley's Chapel in London. The speaker will be the President of Conference, Rev Richard Andrew. It will include survivor stories, presentations from charities and material from young people within the Methodist Church. I hope to go myself and encourage others to join me.

We did not have a Circuit Easter Offering Service this year, but tried to encourage individual churches to hold their own service using the material provided by MWiB. I know that several churches did, and Rev Leslie Noon adapted it beautifully and used it as our Mission Group service in June. The amount raised in the Circuit for the World Church this year amounted to £1,778.90, and the appeal was supported by most of our Circuit churches. Thank you to all those who contributed, and a big thank you to Linda Pitts who is our Easter Offering Treasurer. Hers is not always an easy task, and she does it with patience and efficiency!
